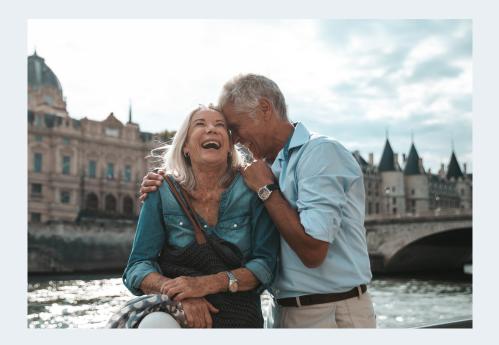

LOCAL HIV NARRATIVES

I am an HIV positive person, who tested positive to HIV in 1998 when I fell ill and was taken to a general hospital. Unknowingly to me, all my family members were aware of this and I was not aware. Stigma and discrimination came as a result. One day, an uncle asked where did I get the ailment that befell me? I was surprised because I did not know why he asked that question. In 1998, I was told that I had typhoid, so I told my uncle that I had typhoid and why did you ask me this question? I asked him and he immediately kept quiet. I got admission into the university to study Nursing in 2003.

In 2005, I started my second placement where I had nowhere to stay. An Aunty of mine lived close to that hospital. I had an opportunity to run all sorts of tests at the hospital for free. So I decided to benefit and run all tests including HIV. The result came out Negative. The third day of the test, my aunt opened a topic about HIV infection and I told her that I did an HIV screening recently and it was negative. My Aunty flared up and said 'it's not true that you can be negative.' I went inside and brought out the negative report from a reputable laboratory and she insisted that you must go and do re-test because you cannot be negative. I went ahead to another laboratory and the result came out Negative again and I never fell ill again....

In 2007, when I was almost graduating, I went for my final placement and was posted to another hospital, just about to finish my placement. A vulnerable child from a very poor background was brought to this hospital and required blood transfusion. Due to the fact that I care so much and I'm passionate about kids, I volunteered to donate blood to this child. Series of tests were done and my blood was never given and my Packed Cell Volume was enough to give him blood. I rotated my placement to the lab and my result was hidden from me. Later, 2 days to finishing the placement, a course mate told me that one of the Doctors told her that there was something about me. 'What is that thing about me' I asked, but she never gave me an answer. That was what made me go further to do an extensive test in a lab where I know no one. Gracefully, my HIV result came out Positive. I told the lab scientist and insisted, as a student nurse and that I wanted to do it myself, that I know how to do it and read the result. The lab scientist gave me a kit and the test came out positive. I confirmed and read it myself. Lo and behold, it indeed came out Positive. Since all these years, no one could tell me the truth. No hospital, no laboratory. Nobody is interested in telling me what my HIV Status was. I started care in 2007 and got a job. I faced the highest level of stigma and discrimination at this working place and these are some of the reasons I find my way to Canada to seek asylum and told my judge about what I faced in Africa, my home Country. The Judge declined and asked me to appeal my situation. This is my HIV Positive journey and life has been treating me unfairly due to my situation.

This is how I could have died a trajectory death, If I hadn't known my status.

When Casey House opened its doors in Toronto in 1988 it was Canada's first stand-alone treatment facility and hospice for people living with and dying from HIV/AIDS.

In 1988 HIV/AIDS was still, to many people, a disease associated with being other.

It was not uncommon for patients to be cut off by their families, to have the doors of their hospital rooms covered with contaminated blood warnings and, not infrequently, to

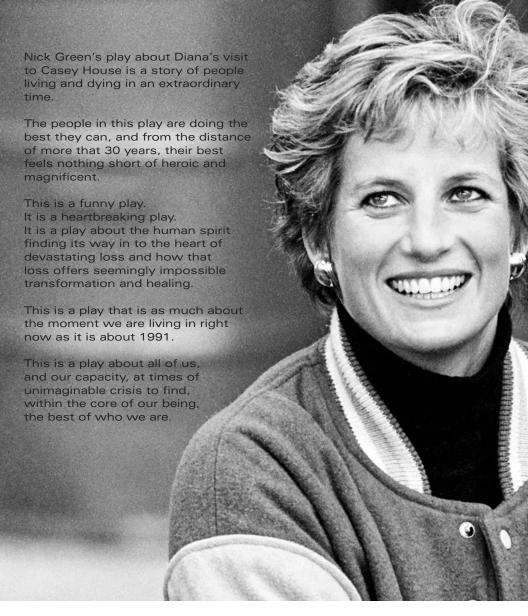
be in the care of medical staff who refused to touch, to pick up used dishes and to change bed linens.

Princess Diana was one of the first globally famous people to be photographed touching and embracing people with AIDS.

When she visited Casey House on October 25th, 1991 the media images of her visit published the next day helped change the narrative of HIV/AIDS in Canada.



These photographs demonstrated cofounder Margaret McBurney's desire that Casey House would be a place where people who were dying would feel loved and get hugged.

Other directing credits include Man of La Mancha for the Stratford Festival, The Wild Party, Falsettos, and The Light in the Piazza. Regionally across North America, Robert has also directed I Am My Own Wife, As You Like It, The Cradle Will Rock, Hair, and Pal Joey. Upcoming, Robert will direct the Canadian premiere of the musical Kimberly Akimbo for The Segal Centre in Montreal and Mirvish Productions in Toronto.

Robert's opera productions include Strauss's final operatic composition Capriccio for Pacific Opera Victoria; La Bohème for the Canadian Opera Company; Turandot and II Barbiere di Siviglia for Arizona Opera; and Associate Direction on Faust for Cincinnati Opera. For Vancouver Opera's The Magic Flute, Robert served as director and dramaturge, as well as creating the libretto adaptation.

Internationally, Robert's work includes direction and dramaturgy of Where Elephants Weep, which premiered in Phnom Penh, Cambodia. He also helmed the Japanese-language production of the Rodgers and Hammerstein musical Carousel at the Galaxy Theatre in Tokyo. In commercial theatre, Robert was the Associate Director for the Broadway and National Touring productions of Mamma Mia! and recently directed the Mexico City, São Paulo, and Buenos Aires productions. Additionally, he served as Associate to Harold Prince for the pational tour of Show Roat

Since 2012, Robert has facilitated Noteworthy, a musical theatre writers' development program for Musical Stage Company in Toronto. He has also taught theatre masterclasses for The Shanghai Academy, Arte Studio (Mexico City), HB Studio (New York), The Royal Conservatoire (Glasgow), and across Canada.

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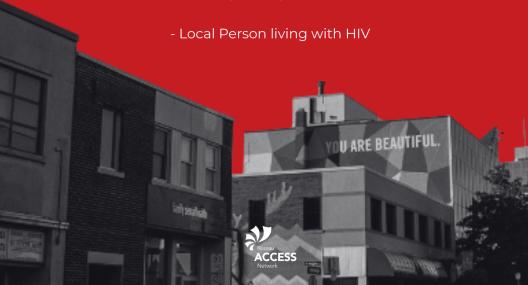
I'm 69, I am a mother, I am a grandmother, and a great grandmother, and a dog mom. I have been living with HIV for 31 years. I have been with the same partner for 25 years, my partner is HIV negative. I was co-infected with HIV and Hep C for a while; about 15-20 years. After the loss of my son at 10 months, a long-term abusive relationship and chronic headaches and pain. I learned to cope with cocaine. Cocaine gave me short term relief from the grief, from the hurt and the pain. While I used my own injection supplies, there was one instance where someone had taken my syringe and replaced it with theirs, knowing they were HIV positive. This is how I was infected.

I was the first woman diagnosed with HIV in Sault Ste Marie. First of all, I was tested early in my infection, right at the beginning. The first test was negative. They noticed enzymes and decided to do another test that came out positive. They told me my HIV status over the phone. I had no people around to support me during or after the phone call. I was diagnosed on Valentine's Day 1995. My experience at the substance use treatment centre was degrading in the sense that they did not have the tools to support me with my diagnoses. The day after I was diagnosed, they gave an education session to the patients at the centre. It felt embarrassing, degrading, confusing, and caused me a lot of anger. It seemed like all the other patients knew it was about me; everyone was staring at me. The staff at the substance use centre didn't think I was accepting my diagnosis. They sat me on a chair in the middle of a circle and had the other (HIV negative) patients confront me on my HIV status, because I wasn't crying and because I wanted to do my own laundry and because, according to them, I was washing my hands too much. When I went to the ASO at the Sault, they just gave me information on HIV.

My experience with doctors in clinical or ER settings has been painful. They would stand far away from me, when I needed a hysterectomy, it was really hard to find a doctor to perform the surgery. Finally, we found a doctor in Sudbury, so I didn't have to go to Toronto. After my hysterectomy, the letters HIV in black and bold were above my bed while I was recovering. I didn't even know it was there, my daughter told me when she visited. My daughter was appalled by that. I felt embarrassed not only for myself, but for my family.

I have two dear/close friends that died due to HIV/AIDS related causes. I was friends with both before any of us were diagnosed, we worked the bar together. One friend died in the late 90's because the medication she was offered was too difficult to be on for her, so she decided not to take them. Without treatment her health declined, and me and my friend sadly found her passed/deceased in her apartment of a heart attack. My other friend went to Ottawa for substance treatment. I knew her HIV was not doing well and she was living with AIDS. Next thing I heard, she had died. I have a lighter cover that she made for me. When I feel down, I put my lighter in it so I can feel close to her. It still comforts me.

HIV took many people from this Earth. Many people died very young. The medications were very difficult and brought me close to death. I'm grateful to the staff at HAVEN for finding the right treatment for me.









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
